

Alabama's 24 community colleges generate \$8.1 billion for the state's economy

According to an independent report by Lightcast, a global leader in labor market analytics, students and alumni of the Alabama Community College System (ACCS) contributed \$8.1 billion to the state's economy, an amount equal to about 3% of Alabama's total gross state product.

"The ACCS enriches the lives of students by raising their lifetime earnings and helping them achieve their individual potential," the report states. "The colleges benefit state and local taxpayers through increased tax receipts and a reduced demand for government-supported social services."


The report also states Alabama's community colleges support 114,043 jobs in Alabama, which is equivalent to one in every 26 jobs. Some students, who might have otherwise left Alabama for higher education, stayed because of the opportunities available at the state's community colleges. In the 2023-24 school year, 3% of ACCS students were from out of state, with some relocating to Alabama specifically to attend a community college.


While the ACCS plays a role in attracting and retaining talent, its greatest impact comes from its alumni. In FY 2023-24 alone, ACCS alumni generated \$6.9 billion in added income, supporting the equivalent of 96,200 jobs in Alabama.

Over the years, the ACCS has become the largest training entity in the state. Its graduates and students have gained valuable skills and knowledge, enabling them to contribute meaningfully to Alabama's workforce.

Individually, students can expect a more than reasonable return on investment from their 2-year education. For every dollar a student invests in their education with the ACCS, they can expect to gain \$5.60 in lifetime earnings. Alabama's 2-year college system generates more tax dollars than it takes. State taxpayers will see \$1.20 in added tax revenue and public sector savings for every dollar invested into the system. Society will also benefit \$6.50 in added incomes and social savings for every dollar.

Breaking into cybersecurity

The ACCS has teamed with Advantage Consulting & Solutions to launch the inaugural cohort of the Alabama Cybersecurity Fellowship Program, giving students both classroom lessons and hands-on training in cybersecurity.

Thanks to funding from Innovate Alabama, students at Wallace-Dothan, Enterprise State, and Trenholm State Community Colleges will begin a 16-week internship course in Spring 2025, earning \$18 per hour and three college credits toward their computer science degree.

"It's been hard for cybersecurity students to find these opportunities," said Dr. Abby Carter, ACCS Associate Director of Computer Information/Technology Instructional Programs. "This fellowship solves that problem."

Advantage Consulting & Solutions offers students a simulated computer network

environment, mimicking commercial and public sector networks, to provide hands-on cybersecurity experience without exposing sensitive information.

"We're helping students start at the basics, providing them the tools and knowledge they need to prevent these common mistakes and protect systems in the real world," said Kelvin Seldon, CEO of Advantage Consulting & Solutions.

Trenholm State Community College student Amari Raye will be among the first participants. "First, I love cyber security. Since I gained an interest over time as a child with computers, I thought cyber security, protecting people and keeping them safe with their information would be the best thing for me," said Raye.

The ACCS announces expansion of healthcare training programs

The ACCS announced plans to expand its Health Science offerings across the state's community colleges in 2025, specifically showcasing the new Nursing Support Technician-Certified option in a press conference conducted at the Alabama Archives and History Auditorium.

Nursing Support Technicians gain advanced skills in tasks like drawing blood, assisting with respiratory care and other fundamental nursing functions.

The Alabama Board of Nursing (ABN) announced the new nursing credential, aiming to fill more than 2,000 current vacancies in the state.

"The NST-C gives us an opportunity to lead and create a dynamic shift in the nursing industry, and we are proud to explore creative, innovative and sound approaches to address the industry's toughest challenges," said Peggy Benson, Executive Officer for the ABN.



Alabama community college students push themselves to succeed with handson training, as early as their first semester. At Alabama's 24 community and technical colleges, students gain real-world experience that helps them prepare for jobs and build careers. At community colleges like Calhoun, students quickly realize how much the college invests in their success. Many faculty and staff were once students, with several having children who attend or have graduated. This connection highlights the lasting impact Alabama's community colleges have on families.

Ernest Williams, Math Instructor and Department Chair at Calhoun, knows this firsthand. His son, EJ, began his education at Calhoun before moving on to and graduating from Athens State University.

"A community connects people, welcomes all who come, and values each individual," said Williams. "When one of its members succeeds, the whole community succeeds. A community college teaches more than principles and concepts; a community teaches life. That is the power of a community college education."
